

### Northwest Justice Project

- ▶ Northwest Justice Project (NJP) is the largest non-profit law firm in Washington.
- ► NJP provides free civil (non-criminal) legal services to people who cannot afford a lawyer.
- ▶ NJP has 18 field offices.



#### NJP's Native American Unit

- ▶ NJP's Native American Unit (NAU) provides legal assistance in those areas of critical and unique importance to Native clients.
- ▶ The NAU offers free legal services in:
  - Cases involving state agencies' policies and practices that have had disproportionate, harmful impacts on Native communities;
  - Cases that strengthen tribal sovereignty and selfgovernance; and
  - ► Cases involving the civil collateral consequences arising from being a victim of crime.

### Native American/Alaska Native Youth in WA State Public Schools Today

- 15,074 AI/AN\*\* students enrolled (out of 1,133,973)
  - Does not capture mixed race AI/ANs
  - ▶ Does not capture Hispanic AI/ANs
  - ▶ Big #s because of assimilationist policies
- ▶ 60.4% graduation (80.9% state average)
- ▶ **64.7% regular attendance** (82.9% state average)


# How public schools can better serve our students

- History: Acknowledge impact of boarding school practices;
- Culture: Deepen understanding of cultural variances between families, schools, and educators and how they influence student learning, self-perception, and connection to school;
- Curriculum: Revisit how we teach about Native peoples (past and present, not limited to an historical archetype)

### Differing Circumstances, Differing Needs

#### Every tribe and district will have different needs, resources, & priorities.

- Tribes working with (sub)urban school districts, rural school districts, or both
  - Snoqualmie Tribe is nearest tribe to about 10 districts, which are primarily nearby and among the largest and most affluent in the state.
- Tribes working with numerous school districts
  - ▶ Colville Confederated Tribes and Spokane Tribe are each the nearest tribe to roughly 40 districts – most of which are small, far away, and have high percentages of low-income students.
- Districts working with multiple tribes
  - ▶ Some districts, from the 54,000 student Seattle Public Schools to the 800 student Chewalah School District, have more than one tribe with whom they should be partnering.
